#### Who Are We?

The John Jermain Library, a significant part of the Sag Harbor Historic District since 1973, was commissioned in 1910 by Margaret Olivia Slocum Sage as a tribute to her grandfather, Major John Jermain, and gifted to the community of Sag Harbor.


The library expanded its footprint in 2016 with a bright, accessible addition that doubled its original size. The library offers an array of resources including books, e-books, audiobooks, media, local history materials, museum passes, WiFi, and public computers. It also hosts diverse cultural programs such as story times, art exhibits, language classes, book clubs, movies, and concerts.

Serving an area that aligns with the Sag Harbor Union Free School District, and encompassing the incorporated villages of Sag Harbor and North Haven, Noyac, and the Mount Misery, Eastville, and Baypoint neighborhoods, the John Jermain Library plays a vital role as a key stakeholder in the Main Street business district and is a founding member of the Sag Harbor Cultural District.

### Policies and Future Plans

 Adaptability and sustainability are concepts that JJML takes very seriously. Because of that, the library's <u>Sustainability</u> Policy and its <u>25-27</u> Strategic Plan reflect the understanding that sustainability is a lifelong commitment and the library is willing to learn and grow as we become better at taking care of our environment and communities.



# Waste and Energy Audits

 A full-scale waste audit identified areas to reduce landfill output and improve recycling. An energy audit conducted with PSEG provided a structured plan to improve building efficiency and reduce energy consumption.



# Building and Systems Improvements

 The library installed energy-efficient appliances (HVAC), upgraded lighting, and added pipe insulation to reduce heat loss. Low-flow fixtures were implemented to conserve water, and indoor plants were added to enhance air quality and ambiance.



## Community-Focused Programs

- A plastic bag recycling program was introduced for both patrons and staff.
- JJML partners with the local food pantry.
- The Library also has a community herb garden.
- To promote free access to books for children ranging from birth to 5 years old, The John Jermain Memorial Library was also part of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.
- Programs were expanded to include themes on environmental education, charity, sustainable living, and local conservation efforts. Truly focusing on the fact that we are all in this together.





## Landscaping and Exterior Enhancements

 Landscaping was designed using native plants requiring minimal watering and maintenance, contributing to ecological health and reducing long-term upkeep.



## Staff Development and Culture

• Staff were trained on sustainable practices and inclusive service models, promoting a culture of innovation, accountability, and shared commitment to long-term sustainability.
