To find a baseline for waste reduction work, the University of Maryland Libraries conducted a waste audit at the campus's main library.

Organized by the libraries' former Sustainability Graduate Assistant Julia Ethan, the libraries partnered with the university's Facilities Management Department to host the event.

Ethan's work leading a waste audit for the library attracted nearly two-dozen volunteers made up of both students and library staff, racked up thousands of views on social media, and made headlines in two campus newspapers. In total, about 90 pounds of waste was sorted and analyzed to better inform the library on which items may have more responsible alternatives for disposal.

## Welcoming Rebecca T. Miller as New Our Sustainability Coordinator

We are excited to welcome Rebecca T. Miller as the new Sustainability Coordinator at the Suffolk Cooperative Library System (SCLS). In this role, Rebecca will be responsible for supporting the 56 member libraries of Suffolk County as well as managing the Sustainable Libraries Initiative (SLI) and its Sustainable Library Certification Program (SLCP).

Formerly a longtime editorial leader and publisher of *Library Journal* and *School Library Journal*, Rebecca has consistently tapped on the evolving conversation around libraries as key players in creating resilient communities. She has written numerous editorials and articles focused on the topic, shaped event programming to explore aspects of it, and spoken on the subject in settings large and small—all to further amplify the potential of prioritizing sustainable thinking as central to responsible stewardship and solid strategic thinking.

Among her contributions, Rebecca developed *LJ*'s "Sustainability" column, in collaboration with SLI's Rebekkah Smith Aldrich; envisioned projects such as *LJ*'s New Landmark Libraries; and collaborated with funding partners to create award programs such as the Best Small Library in America Award and the Jerry Kline Community Impact Prize. Over her career, she has also served on the boards of Floyd Memorial Library in Greenport, NY, and the Great Neck Library, NY. She earned her MLIS from Pratt Institute, NY.

As one of the SLI's co-creators, Rebecca's deep connection and commitment to the goals of the SLI go back to the beginning.

"Rebecca is a legend in our profession," said Rebekkah Smith Aldrich, SLI Co-Founder & Board President. "We are incredibly lucky to be working with her in this role. Her birds eye view of the library profession, thanks to her years of service at *Library Journal*, makes her a uniquely perfect person to help advance the core value of sustainability in our profession."

Rebecca joined the team on Jan. 5, 2026, and has been working closely with Alex Blend as he moves to a new role in the Outreach Department for SCLS. ### Digital Decluttering: For Your Mind and the Planet

- Thursday, February 26 @ 2:00 pm EST

Building on our January webinar regarding AI and the environment, this webinar, presented by Sarah Tribelhorn from the San Diego State University Library, will explore how personal digital habits directly impact the world around us.

Storing vast amounts of data requires significant energy; by deleting unnecessary files and emails, you can reduce energy consumption and lower your carbon footprint. Furthermore, reducing the amount of data we store lessens the need for the massive hardware housed in data centers, helping to minimize e-waste and extend the lifespan of your personal devices.

In addition to environmental sustainability, this webinar will focus on how a "digital detox" supports your mental well-being. A cluttered digital environment often leads to feelings of overwhelm, whereas clearing out digital "junk" can reduce stress and anxiety, improve focus, and boost mental clarity.

We will guide you through simple, actionable steps to start your journey, such as deleting unused apps, organizing and deleting duplicate photos, clearing out downloads, documents and trash folders to free up space. By the end of this session, you will have the tools to foster sustainable digital habits that benefit both your productivity and the planet.


