



Our school library was not utilized as a school library until the 2024-2025 school year, and had not had a librarian for over 15 years!



Teaching for Learning: Instruction

 **Critical Skills are being taught occasionally by the school librarian in an isolated manner**

 **Benchmarks in the library are unclear, assessment is erratic**

 **Learners do not assess their own learning**

Teaching for Learning: Literacy and Inquiry



Classroom Teachers seldom collaborate with school librarian on assessment of information, digital literacy, and technology benchmarks.



Few opportunities to foster independent reading



Learners occasionally have opportunities to direct inquiry learning

Building the Environment: Access

 **Library has a partially flexible and partially fixed schedule**

 **Faculty and learners are not aware of resources**

 **Resources and technology are not consistently accessible**

Empower Learning through Leadership: Outreach



School community does not receive updates on library resources and services



Limited library advocacy plan



Impact of library resources is minimal


Collaborations with science, math, and ELA departments, hope of expansion to others



Utilize library interns to be advocates for the library, through student leadership meetings and library communication such as instagram, the website and our upcoming newsletter








Library Visits by Academy this year


