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Year In Review

2023 proved to be another exciting year for the Sustainable Libraries Initiative!

A common theme across the year was growing our community of practice. We found new friends across the U.S., and now Canada too! We continue to develop resources, educational opportunities, and new ways to accelerate work on sustainability in libraries for our growing membership.

We were proud to introduce the academic library certification program nationally! We'd like to give a big shout out to Valencia College in Florida for completing the Sustainable Library Certification Program, and to their leader, Nardia Cumberbatch, for stepping up to be a mentor for the next wave of academic libraries pursuing certification AND for joining the SLI Advisory Board! We are thrilled to be able to meet academic libraries where they are and help them move forward.

We were particularly grateful to OCLC and WebJunction in 2023 for helping to turn up the volume on sustainability – big time! – by hosting us through their Distinguished Seminar Series AND helping to produce a <u>six part series on sustainability</u> that was viewed by thousands of our colleagues.

We partnered with statewide groups across the country, from three new state library associations and their memberships (Iowa, Massachusetts, and New York) joining the SLI to the production of the Northeast Summit on Climate Resilience for Library Facilities with eight State Libraries (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, and Vermont) to the California State Library's new Sustainable California Libraries Grant.

While we were working on everyday success, we also had our eye on the future. We were very excited to announce a new partnership with the American Library Association in 2023 to create a **National Climate Action Strategy for Libraries.** This is an amazing opportunity to accelerate the work of climate action in our profession and significantly build the community of practice sharing information and advocating for libraries to be key players in local community resilience plans. Stay tuned for more information in 2024!

Very early in the process, interested committee members were identified and the committee evolved over time as one person's expertise was exhausted, and another new committee member was identified. This helped us bring so many voices from the community into the process. Also, our monthly Sustainability Corner column in our newsletter has been regularly cited by patrons as a catalyst for small changes they have made in their own households and that is one of the things we are most proud of—not only that our library is certified sustainable, but that our patrons are inspired to be more mindful about their own actions and choices as well."

Examples from our Certified Libraries

- The Great Giveaway, as part of Suffolk Libraries' Great Give Back Program, was held in 2021 and 2022 at the **Harborfields Public Library**. The community and library staff donated gently used or brand new unwanted items in the hopes that they may find a home. Leftover items were donated to a charitable organization. Similarly, **Shelter Island Public Library** holds monthly clothing swaps, keeping clothing out of landfills.
- Students and staff of **Valencia College Library** volunteer with Covenant House -- an organization supporting youth experiencing homelessness. Service efforts include cleaning and maintaining the facility, collecting donations, and helping with career finding.
- Mamakating Public Library partnered with a local environmental organization to offer trail walks and Full Moon Bike Rides. These programs encourages multigenerational connection and use of local resources.
- School librarian Michelle Statfeld noticed her student's excessive screentime and used her concern-fueled motivation to create activities encouraging students and their families to unplug. Michelle plans on expanding this initiative into a "Screen Free Week" at her school embracing the benefits of human connection without screens.



SCLS Electricty Consumption over Time


Results

Percent change (cost): **76.8%** decrease


Percent change(consumption):85.4% decrease





What caused the decrease between 2016 and 2021?

- 100% LED lighting
- All lights turned off (automatically or manually) when not in use
- Automated building management system and regular maintenance of HVAC systems
- Improved building insulation and proper shading on windows
- Auto-sleep settings on computers and copiers,
 and the conversion to laptops for all staff
- Purchase of solar panels over time









What caused the slight increase between 2021 and 2023?

 - Free and available to all staff/visitors!









Impact






