Name: Avon Lake Public Library

With an IMLS summer reading program grant awarded by the State Library of Ohio, The Avon Lake Public Library enlisted the help of an Eagle Scout candidate to construct a children's garden. The garden is used for several library programs such as the "playing in the dirt" garden club, education on the benefits of locally grown food, and raising animals in tandem with indoor chick incubation.

Thanks to these programs, the library reports benefits of inspiring and instilling healthy habits in local youth, building community connections by bringing more people in to the library, and giving back to the community by letting the fresh food go home with kids or by donating it to the town's Community Resource Services.



The library is also home to one of seventeen "Ozone Gardens" in the United States: a collection of plants sensitive to harmful levels of ground-level ozone. Due to the plants' sensitivity to poor air quality, the garden serves as an indicator for air pollution that can lead to respiratory distress or damage in humans and other animals – allowing mitigative or adaptive action to be taken before the full extent of the consequences.

# Announcing Our New Partnership with the Vermont Library Association!





A new partnership between the Sustainable Libraries Initiative (SLI) and the Vermont Library Association (VLA) aims to equip VLA members with tools and resources to address the challenges and mitigate the impact of climate change

Through this partnership, Vermont joins 6 other states including lowa, Maine, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, and Virginia in committing to sustainability by ensuring access to sustainability tools, webinars, vendors, program ideas, and educational materials.

"We are very excited to work more closely with the Vermont Library Association and enable all of their members to accelerate their adoption of sustainable thinking," said Rebekkah Smith Aldrich, Board President of the Sustainable Libraries Initiative, "Positioning the Vermont library community as leaders in the conversation about climate change mitigation and adaptation is a strong move to ensure libraries contribute to their community's resilience and remain relevant and responsive institutions."

Several Vermont libraries are already involved with the Sustainable Libraries Initiative, including Norman Williams Public Library: the first to complete the certification program in the state earlier this year.

Members of VLA who opt-in via the SLI website will receive one free year of annual membership to the SLI and a 20% discount on the award-winning Sustainable Library Certification Program. Cohorts of five or more libraries will receive a 25% discount on certification, supporting the principle that there is power in collective action.

Mandi Goodsett is the Performing Arts & Humanities Librarian / OER & Copyright Library at Cleveland State University. She is the outgoing coordinator of ALA's Sustainability Roundtable, a co-founder of the Academic Library Association of Ohio's Sustainability Interest Group, and the founder of her library's Sustainability Interest Group. Her research interests include misinformation, sustainability in libraries, and generative Al uses in research, especially as they relate to environmental impacts.

Sarah Tribelhorn is the Sciences and Sustainability Librarian at San Diego State University. She has been instrumental in leading sustainability initiatives in the University Library, including the formation of a library Sustainability Committee and the Library's participation in the Sustainable Libraries Initiative Certification Program (SLCP) for academic libraries to benchmark sustainability within the library. Other initiatives have included mapping the work being carried out in the University Library to each of the 17 United Nations (UN) Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), increased campus and community engagement in sustainability projects, and the promotion of citizen science programming relevant to the community.





Vincent Hyland is a coordinator for the New York City School Library System. Previously, Vincent was a school librarian in a middle and high school in Brooklyn, NY. Vincent was a member of the team that updated the School Librarian Benchmarks for the SLCP, and is a mentor to librarians in New York City currently working through the program. He is a former president of the New York City School Librarians' Association.
