Adaptation of Sustainability Policy

The Harrison Public Library is committed to consistently reducing its environmental footprint and being a thoughtful steward of the resources our community depends upon.

The Library Trustees, Administration and Staff strive to represent this goal at all levels of our organization and every aspect of our operations. This is enacted in the adoption of this Sustainability Policy, which emphasizes employing environmentally sound, economically feasible practices, including the application of our Sustainable Purchasing Policy.

In our commitment to sustainability, we will also continue to strive to be an educational resource for our patrons regarding environmentally conscientious practices which may also be demonstrated in our programming and collections.

Adaptation of Sustainable Purchasing Policy

(*Excerpt*) The Library shall take the following into consideration when making purchases, although this is not an exhaustive list:

- Recyclability of the items
- Packaging and whether the product contains or produces toxins
- Transportation distances and impacts for delivery of the items
- Ability for an item to be repaired or repurposed rather than re-purchasing
- The entire life cycle of a product, from manufacture through use and disposal
- The environmental practices of the vendors under consideration

GARDENS

The Harrison Public Library is proud to now have gardens at both of its buildings! These areas are public spaces for the community to enjoy, and provide ample opportunities for teaching about gardening, healthy eating, and insects.

Meticulous Groundskeeping

The Library took steps to remove invasive plants, eliminate chemical pesticides and herbicides, and have healthy planting areas.

For example, organic mulches were selected and applied around plant bases, ensuring proper soil health and plant growth.

Impact: The library garden has seen reduced weed proliferation and lower water usage, demonstrating the effectiveness of the mulching strategy.

In addition, our pollinator garden attracts insects that help to keep our small but mighty ecosystem healthy!

Zoom Room at Halperin Building



In April 2024, we began offering a dedicated Zoom Room to patrons.

The room features wireless casting to a TV screen and provides the ability to start an instant Zoom meeting and invite participants.

Having this room helps us to serve patrons who work remotely and lessens the need for these patrons to drive to work.

Section E: Energy

Highlights

- LED light bulbs have been installed at both buildings.
- Maintenance on the HVAC equipment is scheduled twice a year at both buildings and is performed by PolyTemp, our HVAC vendor.
- We amended our operations plan to require the purchase of ENERGY STAR-rated equipment whenever possible. This commitment aligns with our Sustainability Policy, ensuring responsible energy use and long-term cost savings.
- Personal appliances such as refrigerators, heaters, and coffee makers are prohibited.
- Workstations and printers are centrally located for multi-staff use.

Section F: Water


Water Smart Landscapes

We have designed the Halperin Building's Reading Garden as a water-smart landscape, and the new garden at West Harrison is being built the same way. We are partnering with Peter Gisolfi Associates LLP to ensure both projects save water and look great.

Water Disposal



Both library buildings have sanitary sewers. All wastewater generated from cleaning is disposed of in these utility sinks.

Water Bottle Fillers



Water bottle fillers have been installed at both buildings.

In addition, we no longer purchase bottled water. These steps help to reduce plastic waste.

Decrease in Water Usage

From 2023 to 2024, HPL's water usage in gallons decreased from 165,326 to 107,712. A drop of nearly 35%.

Upcycle Craft Programs

Using upcycled materials for craft programs and donated old coloring books instead of newly printed coloring pages demonstrates our commitment to sustainability and sets a positive example for children.



Electronic Library Card Signup



Our most frequently used paper form used to be our library card application. Now, the vast majority of library card signups take place through a QR code that sends patrons to the application online.

Section H: Collective Impact

Taste of Harrison





The Harrison Public Library has a successful working relationship with numerous eateries in the downtown Harrison area. Harrison hosts an annual food festival. called Taste of Harrison. During Taste of Harrison, people can purchase a wristband that allows them to sample food from more than 20 downtown eateries. All proceeds go to the Library. At the 2025 event, our community raised over \$32,000 for the Library!

Advocating for Seniors

The Library has close relationships with both the downtown and the West Harrison Senior Centers.

In 2024, we partnered with STEM Alliance to host a program called "Cyber Seniors" at both senior centers to teach seniors how to use a computer.

Ultimately, the 25 seniors who completed the course received a free Chromebook and a hotspot.

We also host other programs at the senior centers, such as concerts and craft events.

Tackling Food Insecurity



Westchester Library System proudly partners with United Way and Feeding Westchester to help coordinate, collect, and distribute canned goods across Westchester County. Both library buildings serve as drop off sites for this annual three week program.

Support for Local Business



Allegria Ristorante, West Harrison, NY

In late 2023, the Library Director and West Harrison adult librarian visited Allegria shortly after it opened (right next door to the West Harrison Branch) to welcome restaurant staff to the community.

A few months later, in January of 2024, the Library hosted a civic engagement luncheon and conversation at the restaurant.

Furthermore, in September of 2024, Allegria provided the food (at a discounted price) for the West Harrison Branch's Open House, and as a token of our appreciation, the Library left out menus from Allegria for the public to take in order to promote the restaurant.

Section I: Social Cohesion

Cultural Competency Education

In early 2023, all library staff members were required to take "Librarian's Guide to Homelessness (Core Training)," which despite its very specific title, covered a wide range of topics relating to understanding all types of people. For example, the training taught staff to lean into the mindset of we are all different and that's okay, as opposed to trying to figure out how somebody else might be similar to oneself. The training also taught staff the value of empathy in customer service and encouraged staff to consider somebody's upbringing and home environment (e.g., Was this person raised in poverty? Grow up in a crowded, loud, competitive household/neighborhood? Might this person be accustomed to different social norms than I?) before reacting in a difficult situation.

Program Development Based On Community Aspirations

Our West Harrison Branch's adult librarian holds a degree in statistics and has assisted with numerous data analysis projects for the Library. These projects have included analyzing American Community Survey (ACS) and census data to help the Library better understand the community's demographics, as well as analyzing circulation and programming data.

Recently, this librarian has been struck by studies outlining loneliness in society, particularly among men. In April of 2024, he started a Men's Meetup Group at the West Harrison Branch. Over the past year (as of March of 2025), he has hosted discussions on topics such as sports, travel, books, community, careers, and mental health in an effort to help men get to know other men. Food is served at these gatherings, which typically draw between five and nine men.

Section J: Resilience Planning

Resiliency Planning in the Collection



The Harrison Public Library actively maintains and updates a diverse collection of materials that address sustainability, climate change, disaster preparedness, social equity, and local community issues. These resources are available in multiple formats—including books, eBooks, audiobooks, and databases—to ensure accessibility for all patrons. Our collection includes:

- Guides on emergency readiness and environmental stewardship
- Books on climate change and local conservation efforts
- Titles exploring racial and social justice, inclusion, and equity
- Materials that support civic engagement and community resilience

Community Disaster Recovery Support System



Both library buildings are recognized as cooling and heating centers by Harrison government.

In addition, after an apartment fire in November 2022, the American Red Cross set up a temporary office in the study room of the Halperin Building in downtown Harrison.

Finally, staff members who were working at the library in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy in 2012 will never forget the sight of the Halperin Building - which was fortunate enough to have its power restored very quickly - filled wall-to-wall with patrons (many sitting on the floor) charging their electronics and trying to figure out a way to work through it all.

Storytimes with First Responders



We host storytimes with first responders, including firefighters and police officers, and they have become one of our most loved and well-attended events. Children get to meet local heroes, ask questions, and build trust in a fun, welcoming setting. These events are now held every year and always shared on our Instagram, helping us celebrate our first responders and strengthen community connections.

Section K: Financial Sustainability

Adequate Fund Balance

As a municipal library, the Harrison Public Library maintains its fund balance in alignment with the Town/Village of Harrison's Fund Balance Policy.

We have and will continue to maintain a good working relationship with the Town.

The Library adheres to the financial practices and guidance set forth by the Town to ensure responsible fiscal management. The Library currently has a **healthy fund balance**; however, any appropriation of these funds requires formal approval by both the Library Board and the Town Board.

Employee Benefits

- Full-time employees are eligible for health care through UMR, a UnitedHealthcare company. They are also eligible for dental insurance separately through Aetna.
- Full-time employees may enroll in The New York State and Local Retirement System (NYSLRS).

Section L: Collections

Collection Development Policy



The library's current collection development policy integrates Triple Bottom Line principles, which encompass community-driven collection development, a strong emphasis on diversity, equity, and inclusion, and an objective to minimize energy waste and the use of natural resources. We make every possible effort to ensure maximum inclusivity in the design and management of our collection.

Improved Use of Collection and Space

In 2023, we conducted a space audit to find ways of better utilizing the main library building's collections and facilities. In preparation of our 120th Anniversary in 2025, we implemented changes based on that audit to make our collection and space more efficient and inviting. These changes included shorter shelves, more natural lighting, and an expanded computer and study area.

These improvements will ensure we continue offering a welcoming and resourceful environment for our community.
